Introduction

Global and Regional Security Environment

The global security order continued to remain fluid during the year (2019-2020). There were mixed scenarios on the security front at the regional and global levels. In some regions of the world, the security situation deteriorated leading to apprehensions of escalation beyond the regional theatres. The role of non-state actors in compounding inter-state conflicts and adding to the complexity of regional security environment was quite evident, in the wake of the Pulwama attack on Indian security personnel in February 2019, the drone attacks by non-state entities on Saudi oil refineries in September 2019 and Turkish offensive on Kurdish militias within Syrian territory in October 2019.

After progressive taking over of ISIS-controlled territories in Syria since March 2019, the killing of Al-Baghdadi, chief of ISIS on 27 October 2019, pointed to the success of global operations against ISIS. However, the truck-bomb attack in Mogadisu, Somalia, on 28 December 2019 indicated that terrorism was far from over; it continued to pose a critical challenge to the states at the international level. South Asia in general, and India in particular, has faced the challenge of state-sponsored terrorism for a long time. Despite international pressure on states sponsoring terror, the continued use of terrorism as an instrument of state policy by some states has endangered regional security in South Asia and affected regional peace and prosperity.

Global Economy Haemorrhaged

The global economy, haemorrhaged by high debt levels, subdued productivity, and trade tensions had its inevitable impact on international geopolitics. At the back of growth slowdown in major economies around the world, including India, global economic growth dropped to 2.4 per cent during 2019. A report produced by the World

Bank in January 2020 apprehended escalation in global tensions if there were to be wider reverberations of slowdown around the world and resurgence of financial stress in emerging economies of the world. Debt accumulation by advanced economies over the years have weakened state economies and affected their investments in defence and security preparedness. While there was a growth in global defence expenditures in gross terms, allocations on defence as percentage of GDPs were on the decline. Countries all over the world faced domestic pressures to strike a balance between defence and development. Most of them were unable to meet their critical modernisation and replacement needs. At a time when there were signs of recovery in global economy, the Corona pandemic struck, compelling states to frame right fiscal policies to reduce the risk of financial shocks, and strengthen their resilience, enabling them to allocate judiciously for their defence and security.

With growing fissures in the processes and structures that supported globalisation, whether the UN or multilateral trading and financial systems such as the WTO and the World Bank/IMF, multilateralism was less visible than multipolarity in the world. There was a growing trend towards the "my country first" phenomenon, accompanied by nationalism and the weaponisation of trade and technology. India followed a policy of strategic autonomy when it came to trade and international relations. Notwithstanding the complexities of the region, India sought friendly and cooperative relations with its neighbours, including in the extended neighbourhood.

Overview of Global and Regional Security

The global security scenario improved marginally with ISIS taking a hit, yet at regional levels political tensions grew affecting overall ambience for peace and prosperity around different regions of the world. Amid allegations of Russian violation of the terms of Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty of 1987, US President Donald Trump announced on 1 February that the US would leave the Treaty within six months. Russia denied such allegations and suspended its obligations to the treaty a day later. The US

officially withdrew from the Treaty in August. This indicated that the US-Russia consensus on arms control that regulated nuclear weapons since the Cold War was breaking down. There are apprehensions that in the long term, it could potentially lead to an arms-race again and increase the risks of Russia deploying nuclear and conventional missiles along its border with Eastern Europe, posing a serious threat to Europe's security. Apart from non-compliance, the US decision is said to have been influenced by its concerns for China building its nuclear and arsenal unimpeded by any such agreement that limits US power in this field.

In Eastern Asia theatre, the Japan-South Korea trade dispute worsened after Japan announced the removal of South Korea from its list of most trusted trading partners from August onwards. Japan considers South Korean Supreme Court's decision, asking some of the Japanese companies to pay reparations worth \$87,700 to each of the four plaintiffs for wartime forced labour, a violation of the 1965 agreement between the two countries that was designed to settle all such issues involving Japan's 1910-1945 colonial rule over the Korean Peninsula. There are over 70 Japanese companies (including Mitsubishi Heavy Industries, Nachi-Fujikoshi and IHI Corporation) currently facing similar lawsuits in South Korea. The Japanese government took a counter-measure tightening the rules on exports of three key materials to South Korea's chip and smartphone industries — fluorinated polyamide, which is used in the manufacture of displays, photosensitizing agent resist, which is used in chip manufacture, and hydrogen fluoride, which is used to clean chips. The implications were grave for the RoK economy. Similarly, boycotts of Japanese products and services in South Korea affected Japanese brands and also tourism to Japan. While there was visible cooling down of rhetoric over the issue, the two countries could not come to an agreement over the issue.

The West Asian region became a hotbed of sectarian and inter-state conflicts—a continuation of the trend for a long time. During the year, the crisis in Syria continued with Russian fighter planes assisting the Syrian government's efforts against the rebels. While there was no consensus over how to resolve the Syrian crisis, the meeting of minds

over fighting the ISIS seemed to bear fruit with the death of al-Baghdadi in a US special-forces operation in October 2019 near the Turkish border in north-western Syria. The death of Al-Baghdadi weakened ISIS, however, if the continuing inter-state tension and sectarian turmoil in the region remain unattended, it was apprehended that it would provide the context for rise of similar organisations in future. The security situation in the region was expected to decline following the killing of the Chief of Iranian Quds Force, General Qassem Soleimani, in a drone attack by the US on 3 January 2020. The growing US-Iran tension and Iranian temptation to tread a defiant line may lead to further uncertainties and escalation of the conflict jeopardising the prospects of peace in the region further.

Advent of the Pandemic

From December 2019, news reports about the appearance of a new strain of SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome) virus in the Chinese city of Wuhan did the rounds. By February-March 2020, it threatened to spread to different parts of the world taking major parts of the world under its sway by April 2020. Many countries including India announced complete lock-downs to prevent its spread both at local and global levels. All communications came to a stand-still and it was predicted that its impact on global economy would be severe.

South Asian Geopolitics

In the immediate neighbourhood, the security environment remained as challenging as it was during the previous years. A country-wise account of the developments and their possible impact on bilateral relations with India is provided below.

Afghanistan

The situation in Afghanistan remained volatile and tense as fighting raged on between the Taliban and the government troops. The US-Taliban talks in Doha (December 2019) did not seem to make much

headway, even if the US returned to the dialogue table after Trump's cancellation of important secret talks in Camp David, following attacks on US troops by the Taliban in September 2019. After nearly a week of talks the two sides agreed to take a pause for few days shortly after Taliban struck at the Bagram US base on 11 December 2019.

On 29 February 2020 however, the Taliban and the US finally struck a deal that sought to address four issues, i.e., counter-terrorism assurances, troops withdrawal, participation in intra-Afghan dialogue and negotiations, and permanent and comprehensive ceasefire. The deal included (i) Guarantees by Taliban and enforcement mechanisms to prevent the use of the soil of Afghanistan by any group or individual against the security of the United States and its allies; (ii) announcement of a timeline for the withdrawal of all foreign forces from Afghanistan within 14 months (by May 2021); (iii) assurances that the Taliban will start intra-Afghan negotiations with Afghan sides from 10 March 2020; (iv) a permanent and comprehensive ceasefire through intra-Afghan negotiations, which would also jointly implement mechanisms to evolve a future political roadmap of Afghanistan. As per the terms of the agreement the government in Kabul and the Taliban were to exchange prisoners, following which intra-Afghan talks were to begin. However, right since the beginning this condition was not fulfilled in time with both Kabul and Taliban developing differences about the modalities of release of prisoners thus delaying the process of start of intra-Afghan talks from March 2020.

Pakistan

The suicide attack on Indian security personnel in Pulwama in February 2019, claimed by Pakistan-based terrorist organisation, Jaishe-Muhammad, compelled India's non-military and pre-emptive counter terror attack on a terror training camp in Balakot in Pakistan on 26 February 2019. This was a proactive action intended to convey a hard message to Pakistan that use of terror as an instrument of its foreign policy vis-à-vis India was unacceptable to India and it was prepared

to take counter-measures to destroy existing terror infrastructure deep inside Pakistan. Following this incident, Pakistan was visibly under pressure both from within and from the international community to take action against terror groups operating within the country. During the year, the US and its allies continued to urge Pakistan to fulfil its international obligations by bringing the perpetrators of multiple terror attacks launched from its soil on India to justice. In its interactions with the FATF, Pakistan demonstrated its willingness to bring about changes in its laws and regulations to deal with the issues of money-laundering and terror-financing. It also arrested Hafiz Saeed of Lashkar-e-Taiba and 12 of his accomplices in July 2019 for terror financing and is in the process of trying them in the Anti-Terrorism Court (ATC).

Pakistan responded emotively to India's decision to abrogate Article 370 and re-organise the State of Jammu and Kashmir into two Union Territories of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh. Pakistan started a diplomatic offensive at the international level arguing that India had acted unilaterally in violation of the UN resolutions and campaigned for support to put pressure on India for restoration of status quo ante. Unable to muster up international backing, Pakistan has tried unsuccessfully so far to take up the issue among the Islamic countries. At the internal level, the India card was played successfully by the Imran Khan government to divert popular attention away from its failure to address many pressing issues including economy and governance. The internal political scenario in Pakistan evoked the image of a divided house pulling in different directions. The ruling coalition was seen losing its steam despite the fact that it was backed by the military and the opposition stood divided. The institution of Judiciary, which questioned the procedure granting extension of tenure to the army chief and sentenced former dictator Musharraf to death appeared unready for a showdown with the army and asked the government to legalise such extension through amendments to the existing law. The net situation in Pakistan favoured continued predominance of the army in the Pakistani power architecture. Its pursuit of unrealistic goals in its foreign and security policies vis-à-vis India was likely to continue. Pakistan appeared determined to continue its support for the terror groups as well as its adventurism in Jammu and Kashmir, in the shape of ceasefire violations and launching a proxy war against India.

Maldives

In the Maldives, the new government led by Ibrahim Mohamed Solih worked towards strengthening the relationship with India. During the year, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Ibrahim Mohamed Solih met on four occasions, indicating a forward trend in bilateral relationship. Prime Minister Modi chose Maldives as the first destination for his foreign visit after re-election, in June 2019. He had earlier visited the Maldives in November 2018 to attend Solih's swearing-in ceremony. Growing high-level visits between the two countries underlined the improved state of communication between the two countries especially after the new government has come to power in the Maldives.

The Maldives came out with its 'India First' policy, echoing India's 'Neighbourhood First' policy, which lent a new dynamic to India-Maldives relations based on mutual trust, understanding and sensitivity to each other's concerns. India built the Composite Training Centre (CTC) for the Maldives National Defence Force (MNDF), the Ministry of Defence Building, and set up the Coastal Surveillance Radar System (CSRS) in the Maldives. India organised training programmes for MNDF officials in India, and held joint exercises, medical camps, etc. The indigenously developed patrol vessel CGS KAAMIYAAB gifted by the Government of India for the enhancement of Maldivian maritime security was greatly appreciated by the Maldivian government. Both countries set up a Joint Working Group on Counter Terrorism, Countering Violent Extremism and De-radicalisation to deal with the common threats arising from terrorism, radicalism and drug trafficking in the region. A delegation from IDSA led by DG, IDSA visited the Maldives and interacted with the National Counter Terrorism Centre

and MNDF and held a dialogue on CT & CVE. There was a bilateral commitment to work together in emerging areas like renewable energy, agriculture, fisheries and the blue economy. On 04 December the two leaders met through a digital video conference and launched some of the important initiatives announced earlier, such as gifting of patrol vessel CGS KAAMIYAAB to the MNDF, exchange of MoUs for 3 grant projects for setting up fish plants in the southernmost atoll of Addu, installation of about 2500 LED streetlights donated by India, and launcing of RuPay cards in Maldives to encourage tourist arrivals from India.

The pace and progress of the economic package worth US\$1.4 billion (including line of credit worth US\$ 800 million), announced by India was satisfactory during the year. The 6th Joint Commission meeting (JCM) in December 2019 took stock of progress on all MoUs between the two countries and there was exchange of documents for ratification of the treaty for mutual legal assistance on criminal matters as well as MOUs between financial intelligence units and election commissions of both the countries. Both countries worked closely to enhance cooperation for peace, prosperity and mutual security of India and Maldives and for the wider Indian Ocean region.

Bhutan

The India-Bhutan relationship continued to thrive during the year, propelled by renewed commitment to regularly engage each other on a whole gamut of issues ranging from development partnership, hydro-power, trade and economic cooperation to security, and enhancing connectivity between the two countries. The Prime Minister of Bhutan Dr. Lotay Tshering visited India in May 2019 for the swearing-in ceremony of Prime Minister Modi. Prime Minister Modi visited Bhutan in August 2019 and the two countries signed 10 MoUs in the areas of education, IT, space, hydropower, technical education, legal and civil aviation sector. Foreign Minister of Bhutan Dr Tandi Dorji also visited India from 17-23 November 2019 and held talks with the External Affairs Minister, Dr S. Jaishankar.

The two countries held their 2nd Annual India-Bhutan Development Cooperation Talks on 29 November 2019 in New Delhi. Government of India has committed assistance of Rs. 4500 Crore for implementation of development projects and Rs. 400 Crore for transitional Trade Support Facility during Bhutan's 12th Five Year Plan (2018 - 2023). Both countries are regularly monitoring the overall progress of the overall progress of the ongoing Project Tied Assistance (PTA) projects and 359 Small Development Projects (SDPs)/High Impact Community Development Projects (HICPDs) and Bhutan has, from time to time, officially commended India's role in socio-economic transformation of Bhutan.

Bangladesh

The India-Bangladesh relationship received a further boost after the Awami League government, led by Begum Sheikh Hasina, came to power for a record third time in a row. Hasina came on her first official visit after the election to India during 3-6 October 2019, soon after she met the Indian Prime Minister on the side-lines of the UNGA meeting in New York in September and reiterated her commitment to her policy of zero-tolerance against terror. Both the Prime Ministers inaugurated three bilateral projects and signed seven MoUs seeking to establish joint coastal surveillance system, simplify people-to-people movement, expedite the setting up of 12 new border haats, source bulk LPGs from Bangladesh to Tripura, prepare draft frameworks of interim agreements for sharing of water in Feni and six rivers (Manu, Mahuri, Khowai, Gumti, Dharla, and Dudhkumar), start of the work on withdrawal of 1.82 cusec of water from Feni River for drinking purpose of the people of Sabroom town of Tripura, facilitate the use of Chattogram and Mongla ports for movement of goods to and from India, etc. Both leaders also agreed to enhance connectivity between the two countries and decides to operationalize the Dhulian-Gadagari-Rajshahi-Daulatdia-Aricha Route (to and fro) and include Daudkandi-Sonamura Route (to and fro) under Protocol on Inland Water Transit and Trade and commence Dhaka-Siliguri Bus service. There was an increase in the frequency of Maitree Express from 4 to 5 times per week and that of Bandhan Express from 1 to 2 per week. They agreed to enhance air-services air services from existing 61 to 91 services per week from Summer of 2019, and to 120 services per week from Winter 2020 schedule. In December 2019, Bangladesh decided to allow transshipment of Indian goods without custom duties through Chittagong and Mongla ports from January 2020.

India's humanitarian assistance to Bangladesh to support its efforts to shelter the Rohingyas in temporary camps in Cox's Bazar was appreciated by the Bangladesh Government. India supplied, in five tranches, tents, relief and rescue material as well as one thousand sewing machines for skill development of forcibly displaced women from Myanmar. India has also completed 250 houses in Rakhine state of Myanmar, and is now preparing to implement another set of socioeconomic development projects in the area. India-Bangladesh defence cooperation reached new levels with joint initiatives for development of closer Maritime Security Partnership, and finalization of an MoU on Establishment of Coastal Surveillance Radar System in Bangladesh. Both countries finalized implementation arrangements in April 2019 to move forward on the execution of US\$ 500 million Defence Line of Credit extended by India to Bangladesh.

Nepal

India's relations with Nepal improved considerably during the year 2019-2020. Major issues like cooperation in the building of infrastructure and trade have been taken up at the highest level. The Amlekhgunj-Raxaul oil pipeline was inaugurated and operationalised in September 2019. There was substantial progress made on the construction of the integrated check post in Birat Nagar. The first phase of Jayanagar-Janakpur broad-gauge railway line was completed during this year, awaiting inauguration. Feasibility and survey of inland water ways between Nepal and India were undertaken 14th Joint military exercise (Surya Kiran) was conducted with Nepal in

Salijhandi, Rupendehi on 03-16 December 2019 in Nepal Army Battle School. During 2019, the issue of Kalapani was raised in Nepalese media and later officially after Ministry of External Affairs, India, published a new political map that showed the creation of two Union Territories in Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh after abrogating the special status of Kashmir on 5 August.

China allocated US\$21 million for purchasing armed vehicles for use during UN Peacekeeping Operations and disaster kits. Chinese President, Xi Jinping visited Nepal on 11 October 2019 and signed 18 agreements in areas ranging from trade and agriculture to infrastructure and security. 122 Chinese nationals were arrested from Nepal on 22 December 2019, and subsequently deported on allegations of running an illegal online gambling racket, operating Ponzi scheme and hacking private information. There were demonstrations in Nepal against China in November 2019, on the issue of alleged Chinese encroachment along the border as the document released by Nepal's Survey Department in early November, showed that four Nepalese districts sharing border with China – Sankhuwasabha, Rasuwa, Sindhupalchowk and Humla – were seen losing territories as Beijing expanded its road projects.

Sri Lanka

Sri Lanka witnessed a change in government in the presidential elections held in November 2019. In the elections, Gotabhaya Rajapaksa of the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) party defeated Sajith Premadasa of the United National Party (UNP), securing 52.25 per cent of the votes. His brother, Mahinda Rajapaksa, was soon sworn in as prime minister. The electoral success of Gotabhaya Rajapaksa indicated that the Sinhala majority population of Sri Lanka voted for him in anticipation of a strong government which could offer security, economic well-being and national pride. The Easter attacks of April 2019 and the progressive economic decline during the previous years had lowered the popularity of the incumbent government especially among the Sinhala majority, augmenting the electoral prospects of

the Rajapaksas, who had the reputation of having dealt with LTTE decisively in the past.

In the run up to the elections, the Rajapaksas had taken care to assure India of their commitment to improve bilateral relations and desist from actions that could impact India's security interest in the region. Immediately after assuming power, President of Sri Lanka paid a State Visit from 28-30 November 2019 and met with the President and Prime Minister of India. During the meetings, the entire gamut of bilateral relations was discussed and India emphasised the need for a negotiated political settlement, including implementation of 13th Amendment, acceptable to all communities within the framework of a united Sri Lanka, which is consistent with democracy, pluralism and respect for human rights. The Sri Lankan Minister of Foreign Relations, Mr. Dinesh Gunawardena visited India in January 2020 and reiterated the importance laid by President Rajapaksa on exploring newer areas of cooperation with India with emphasis on skill development, vocational training and capacity building and requested India's support.

India offered a new US \$ 400 million line of credit to Sri Lanka to give a boost to infrastructure and development in the country. This is aimed at accelerating various projects in Sri Lanka. Under the Indian Housing Project, 46,000 houses had been constructed for the internally displaced in the Northern and Eastern Provinces of Sri Lanka. Construction of 14,000 houses for Tamils of Indian origin in the Up-Country region is at an advanced stage. The US\$ 100 million credit line for solar projects in Sri Lanka offered by India was under implementation. There were 20 community development projects and other people-centric projects in Sri Lanka, funded by India on the basis of grants in education and infrastructure.

India emphasised the need for a negotiated political settlement, including implementation of 13th Amendment, acceptable to all communities within the framework of a united Sri Lanka, which is consistent with democracy, pluralism and respect for human rights. However, it was felt that the new government was unlikely to act expeditiously on

this issue, mindful of opposition to such an emotive issue among its majoritarian support-base.

India's policy towards its neighbours has always been guided by non-reciprocity, non-interference in internal politics, close partnership in development, and mutual sensitivity towards each other's security. India expects its neighbours to respect its sensitivities and conduct their foreign and security policy in a manner not prejudicial to its security interests.

ACTIVITIES OF THE CENTRES

There are 13 Centres in IDSA with their focus on area studies and thematic issues. The research agenda of IDSA, as a whole, is decided by the Executive Council with inputs from the Ministry of Defence, the Ministry of External Affairs, the Ministry of Home Affairs and other government departments and institutions, from time to time. It is executed by different Centres. The scholars associated with the Centres have their individual research projects, which are reviewed and monitored by the research faculty associated with the Centres, and the Director General.

A brief account of the activities of different Centres for the year 2019-20, is provided below.

Africa, Latin America, Caribbean and UN (ALACUN) Centre

During the past year, the ALACUN Centre has continued to monitor and analyse developments on the African continent, India-Latin America relations, and relevant United Nations activities that impact the areas under study. The Centre continued the publication of a quarterly newsletter on Africa, *Africa Trends*. The newsletter aims to provide readers with reviews and analysis of significant and strategic developments taking place in African countries that impact regional and global security.

The Centre participated as a Knowledge Partner at the First India-Africa Defence Ministers' Conclave 2020, at Lucknow on 06

February 2020. The Centre hosted several activities during this period, including interactions with African delegations, talks and addresses by Ambassadors and eminent persons, and Roundtable Discussions on significant developments in Africa and Latin America. The Centre hosted an interaction with a 39-member delegation from the Rwanda Defence Force Command and Staff College (RDF CSC) on 03 April 2019; a 17-member delegation from Tanzania National Defence College (NDC), led by Brig. Gen. Chelestino Elias Msola on 12 June 2019; and a 16-member delegation from Sudan Armed Forces (SAF) Defence College on 30 September 2019.

The Centre also organized the Fourth India-Africa Roundtable on "India–Africa Partnership in a Changing World" on 29 May 2019 and another Roundtable Discussion on India-Tanzania Relations on 12 February 2020. It organized two Ambassadorial lectures by Mr. André Aranha Corrêa do Lago, Ambassador of Brazil on "India–Brazil Relations" on 02 April 2019 and by Maj Gen. Chis S. Eze (Retd), High Commissioner of Nigeria to India on the theme, "India–Nigeria Relations: Opportunities and Challenges", on 14 August 2019.

Talks by Col. (Dr.) Ali Ahmed (Retd.) on "Crisis Management in UN Peacekeeping" on 10 April 2019, Dr Andeab Gebremeskel, Director General, Eritrean Centre for Strategic Studies on "Current Developments in the Horn of Africa" on 16 May 2019, Ms Elizabeth Sidiropoulos, CEO, South Africa Institute of International Affairs (SAIIA) on "South Africa's Foreign Policy and Future of India-South Africa Partnership" on 21 August 2019, Dr Sanjay Badri-Maharaj, Defence Analyst and Attorney-at-Law, Trinidad and Tobago on "Rise of Terrorism in the Caribbean" on 01 October 2019 and Prof. Hussein Solomon on Trajectories of Extremism in Africa" on 18 November 2019 were other activities that the Centre organized during the year.

Defence Economics and Industry Centre

During the year, the Centre was involved in a number of major studies for the Ministry of Defence (MoD). The final report on Impact of Offsets on the Indian Defence Industrial Base was submitted to the Department of Defence Production (DDP), MoD in May 2019. The Interim Report on HAL as part of a larger study on savings in cost by DPSUs and OFB on account of indigenisation was submitted to the DDP in January 2020. An Approach Paper on Alternative Sources of Funding for Defence Expenditure was submitted to the MoD and other government agencies in September 2019.

The Centre organised the IDSA Eminent Persons Lecture on Technology for National Security on 10 May 2019 by Dr G. Satheesh Reddy, Secretary DD R&D & Chairman DRDO. A Roundtable Discussion was organised on the Defence Budget 2019-20 in July 2019.

During the year, the Centre conducted two Defence Management Courses for the officials of the Ordnance Factory Board (OFB). These were held in the months of June and August 2019. The scholars of the Centre published a number of research papers on various economic aspects of Indian defence.

East Asia Centre

The East Asia Centre primarily focussed on the latest developments in China, Taiwan, Japan, the Republic of Korea (ROK), and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), thereby, covering all the strategic developments in the region. Besides, the Centre also devoted time towards developments in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), the Indian Ocean and Australia, thus, covering the trends in the Indo-Pacific region at large. During the year (April 2019-March 2020), the Centre has emerged as a leading contributor to the debates on East Asia, highlighting implications of India's presence in the region. The Centre is dedicated to research on security, military and foreign policy affairs, and their impact on India's bilateral relations in the region, especially with key actors, institutions and initiatives.

Given the increasing importance of the People Liberation Army's (PLA) and its modernisation, the Centre has also focused its research activities

on analyzing the PLA's approach to the India-China boundary question, and the modernisation in its nuclear deterrence. The Centre has kept a close watch on the various military activities of the East Asian countries in the region. The outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic since January 2020 and the political tussle between China and Taiwan, mainly on the issue of Taiwan's entry into the World Health Organisation (WHO), was one of key highlights in the Centre's activities, both in terms of writings and deliberations at various forums. Further, the protests in Hong Kong since June 2019, fuelled by a controversial extradition bill proposed by the Hong Kong authorities, also captured the attention of the Centre.

The Centre studied the developments in Japanese defence, security and foreign policy. Members of the Centre published writings on themes such as security debates in Japan and its implications for the region, India-Japan relations, Japan's strategy towards China and the Korean Peninsula. A monograph titled, *Japan's Defence Industrial Policy Reform: Debates and Implications for International Cooperation* has been submitted. Moreover, the Centre duly mapped the strategic and security situation in the Korean Peninsula. The Centre members produced scholarly writings and organised events on Korean affairs and visited key institutes and think tanks to engage in discussions and debates.

The Centre published its flagship publication, East Asia Strategic Review. The latest edition of the Review was titled Major Powers and the Korean Peninsula: Politics, Policies and Perspectives, wherein it situated some of the critical issues in the Korean theatre within the competing geopolitical interests, strategic choices and policy debates among the major powers. Additionally, the Centre also published three edited books. The first edited book titled Asia between Multipolarism and Multipolarity, based on the proceedings of the 20th edition of the Asian Security Conference held at IDSA from 26-28 March 2019, essentially sketches out the Asian trajectory and the continent's contemporary journey towards greater multipolarity. The second edited book titled The Korean Peninsula and Indo-Pacific Power:

Status Security at Stake, assesses the strategic linkages that the Korean Peninsula shares with the Indo-Pacific and provides a succinct picture of issues which will shape the trajectory of the Korean Peninsula in the future. The third edited book titled Scaling India-Japan Cooperation in Indo-Pacific and Beyond 2025: Corridors, Connectivity and Contours, examines the scope and potential of India-Japan cooperation factoring infrastructure connectivity and corridors in the Indo-Pacific.

Besides, the Centre members published their articles in well-known international journals and magazines like Asia-Pacific Issues, Defence Security Brief, East Asia Forum, East Asia Forum Quarterly, East-West Wire, Global Asia, ISPI Report, Journal of Middle Eastern Studies, Mega-Trend Review, The Diplomat, The National Interest and the Korean Economic Institute of America. They regularly contribute to national and international newspapers such as The Independent, The Sunday Guardian, The Asian Age, The Pioneer and The Korean Herald.

The Centre has successfully launched and established its bi-monthly newsletter, *East Asia Military Monitor*. Furthermore, trends in the Japanese defence and security landscape are captured in the *Japan Digest*. The Centre Coordinator is the Series Editor of an international book series, the *Routledge Studies on Think Asia*. Such international affiliation is an instance of scholarly excellence in a think tank in India.

The Centre also took the lead in organising the Institute's flagship event, the Asian Security Conference (ASC) this year on the theme "National Security and Defence Planning in an Era of Strategic Uncertainty" (postponed due to COVID-19). The scholars from the Centre travelled to deliver lectures at the training academies of the Indian military, the Border Security Force (BSF), the Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) and various other government forums, adding strength and value to national security thinking. Experts and scholars from the Centre have also delivered keynote speeches, special lectures and chaired important panels in and outside Asia to disseminate knowledge and mainstream Indian thinking on East Asia.

The Centre members received prestigious visiting fellowships from abroad and also received travel opportunities from the Government of India. The Centre organised numerous Roundtable interactions. It hosted delegations from premier universities/think tanks and military institutes located in East Asia, such as Beijing University, China; Hankuk University of Foreign Studies (HUFS), South Korea; China Institutes of Contemporary International Relations (CICIR), China; Nanhua University, Taiwan; Sichuan University, China; Shanghai Institute for International Studies (SIIS), China; the National Institute for Defense Studies (NIDS), Japan; Joint Staff College, Japan, and Japan Ground Self-Defense Force (JGSDF), Japan. Delegations from premier institutes/think tanks in the United States, Europe and other regions of the world have also visited the Institute to specially interact with the Centre's scholars and experts. Furthermore, the Director General, IDSA is on the advisory board of the Shanghai Institute of International Studies (SIIS), China, and also the Honorary Patron of the India-Japan Friendship Association in his personal capacity. Such association is an advantage to the Centre and the organisation at large, in regard to the affairs of China as well as East Asia.

Europe and Eurasia Centre

The Eurasia Centre continued to focus on issues, themes and countries in the Eurasian geographical area. Some areas of focus have been – Russia's foreign policy with emphasis on its outreach towards Central Asia, West Asia and the Indo-Pacific; implications of Russia's ongoing confrontation with the US and entente with China; prospects for strengthening India's engagement with Central Asian countries, including through the SCO; internal developments in Russia and the Central Asian Republics; and multilateral frameworks like the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) and the Collective Treaty Security Organisation (CSTO). The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Russia and Central Asia was also analysed.

The scholars at the Eurasia Centre analysed these issues in their web comments, journal articles and reports.

Internal Security Centre

In 2019-20, the Internal Security Centre had engaged in policy-oriented research projects on border management, left-wing extremism and terrorism. The Centre also worked on three projects entrusted to it by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA). These were: Counter-narratives to Check Radical Ideology, Mainstreaming of Apprehended Maoist Cadres and Radicalisation of Indian Youth and the Action Plan to Deal with the same. Final Reports of the projects were submitted to the Ministry. The Centre was given two more projects by the MHA-Border Management, and Citizens' Pain Points While Accessing Police Services.

During the year, Centre members contributed a short commentary on 'Citizenship Amendment Act' for the IDSA website. A book, *Pakistan Occupied Kashmir: Politics, Parties and Personalities* was also published. The Centre members participated in various national and international conferences in which they presented papers on topics such as combating terrorism, humanitarian consequences of war against terror, India's doctrinal strengths in tackling internal disturbances, IHL/ laws of armed conflict, and security challenges in the Northeast.

The scholars from the Centre delivered lectures on topics such as coastal security, border management, human rights, refugee law and international humanitarian laws at various capsule courses and training programmes organised for the Indian Army, the BSF, the ITBP, the NTRO, etc. Centre members also contributed articles in journals and newspapers on varied issues such as Internal Security of India, Hizb-ut-Tahrir, the Islamic State, Jammu and Kashmir, India's nuclear policy, the Indo-French relationship, etc.

Military Affairs Centre

2019-20 was a productive year for IDSA's Military Affairs Centre, with members intensely engaging in both research work and the Institute's outreach activities. Publications by scholars of the Centre during the year included: a book on the Kargil War; a book chapter on India and the Indo-Pacific; book reviews on Chinese Naval Activities in the Indian

Ocean, and Naval Modernisation in Southeast Asia; research articles on Vietnam's Defence White Paper, Internet of Things and Future Military Operations, and Land Warfare in the Indian Context; Issue Briefs on Aircraft Carriers and India's Maritime Security, and Lowering Colour Service; and commentaries on Military Logistics Agreements, Indian Navy's Annual HADR Exercise, Defence Acquisition Model, Drone Attacks on Saudi Oil Installations, Automation of the Kill Cycle, and Israel's Laser-based missile Interception System. In addition, a report was submitted to Air Headquarters on Disruptive Technologies and Future of Warfare.

During the year, members of the Centre participated in various training programmes organised by the Institute, delivering lectures on Military Diplomacy, Terror Financing, Maritime Security and the Indian Navy, Strategic Significance of Andamans, Chinese Influence in Indian Ocean, India-China Dynamics in the Indo-Pacific, and Maritime Cooperation in the Indian Ocean. In addition, Centre members presented papers in national and international seminars, contributed several answers to the IDSA Website's Ask the Expert section, provided expert views to media organisations, and posted several YouTube videos including on the Kargil War.

The Centre and its members played a critical role in the preparation and publication of the *Strategic Digest* in its new format since October 2019. They also anchored and organised a number of events during the year including: the Y. B. Chavan Memorial Lecture; a seminar on India's National Security Since Kargil; interaction on Defence Diplomacy with a team from the College of Defence Management Secunderabad; interaction on Security Issues with a 39-member delegation of the Rwanda Defence Force Command and Staff College; Workshop on India's Strategic and Diplomatic Priorities for students of the University of Washington on an educational tour; multiple interactions on India-US Defence Partnership and the Indo-Pacific with visiting officials, academics and think tankers; and a Roundtable on Great Power Relations with members of Poland's Centre for Eastern Studies.

Non-Traditional Security (NTS) Centre

The Non-Traditional Security (NTS) Centre meetings were being organised on a weekly basis until the declaration of COVID-19 lockdown on 23 March 2020. The meetings discussed weekly developments related to climate change, energy, renewable energy and water. The Centre produced one Issue Brief and two commentaries on the IDSA website from March to May 2020. The Centre also produced the *NTS News Brief* (weekly) for internal consumption. As part of the outreach programme, the NTS Centre scholars had participated both in national and international events in the review period.

North America Centre

The Director General gave a series of lectures on national security issues to US think tanks in May. He also interacted with Senators, Congressmen and White House officials and Congressional staffers. A Roundtable interaction with Mr. Bradley Bowman, Senior Director, Foundation for Defense of Democracies (FDD), Washington DC, on 29 August 2019, was one of the highlights for the North America Centre. The Centre continued its efforts to analyse developments in the North American region, and its scholars were prolific in their writings on the region in Indian and international periodicals and newspapers.

Nuclear and Arms Control Centre

The Centre worked with the Indian Pugwash Society and organised conferences and Roundtables on nuclear issues in Iran, nuclear security and nuclear proliferation. The Centre also hosted the meeting with the head of the Wassenaar Arrangement. The Centre also contributed to the *Pugwash Digest*.

The scholars of the Centre participated in numerous activities, including TV debates on nuclear and security issues. The most important debates were those in No First Use, Turkey and Nuclear Weapons, K-4 Missiles on Rajya Sabha Television, and Pakistan's nuclear threat. The Centre

had contribution in print media as well. The Centre also produced research papers.

The Centre had participation in seminars and meetings in India and abroad. The scholars from the Centre chaired sessions in the seminars and the International Conferences. The Centre also participated in the Conference of State Parties of the Chemical Weapons Convention at the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons, the Hague. The Centre sent a member as a participant in the Missile Dialogue Initiative organised by the International Institute for Strategic Studies.

A scholar of the Centre gave a presentation in the Workshop on 'Strategic Trade Management in Asia-Pacific' organised by the Pacific Forum in February 2020. Another presentation from the Centre was on 'Intangible Technology Transfers and Emerging Technology Control' at a Workshop on 'Strategic Trade Controls in the Asia-Pacific', organised by the Pacific Forum and the Institute of International Relations, National Chengchi University, Taipei, Taiwan, on 07 November 2019.

The Centre made its presence felt through invited lectures. The Centre Coordinator gave a lecture on 'Globalisation, Technology Transfer and Nuclear Geopolitics' at the 6th Refresher Course in Global Studies (IDC) at the UGC-Human Resource Development Centre, Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU). He also gave a lecture on 'Global Nuclear Order and India', at the 46th Refresher Course in Political Science, Law & Public Administration, organised by the UGC-Human Resource Development Centre, Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), on 21 August 2019.

The expertise of the Centre was used in other research institutions and universities. The Centre Coordinator serves on the Academic Council of Jawaharlal Nehru University, the Board of Studies of the School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, the Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Institute of Asian Studies, the Ministry of Culture, among others. He is also on several committees of the Indian Council of Social Science Research and also serves as the Chairman of the Governing Body of Dyal Singh College, University of Delhi.

South Asia Centre

During 2019-2020, like the previous years, the Centre members engaged themselves in research on issues relating to developments in the South Asian neighbourhood having strategic implications for India.

Special care was taken to revive bilateral contact with partner organisations in the neighbourhood. The fifth edition of the Institute for Defence Studies and Analyses (IDSA) – Bangladesh Institute of International and Strategic Studies (BIISS) Bilateral Dialogue took place in Dhaka on 03 July 2019. The theme of the Dialogue was "Bangladesh-India Cooperation in the Changing Regional and Global Context" and various presentations dwelt on issues ranging from strengthening trade, investment and economic cooperation to improving maritime and security collaboration, and managing water resources.

A delegation from the Centre led by DG, IDSA visited Nepal on 18-19 February 2020 and held a dialogue with the Neeti Anusandhan Pratishthan (NAP), Nepal, the Centre for Nepal and Asian Studies (CNAS), Tribhuvan University, Kirtipur, Nepal, and the Institute for Strategic and Socio-Economic Research (ISSR). The discussions ranged from India-Nepal relations to India's approach to the neighbourhood and the Indo-Pacific.

During 04-06 March 2020, a five-member delegation from IDSA led by DG, IDSA, visited Sri Lanka and bilateral dialogues were held with four Sri Lankan institutes—the Bandaranaike Centre for International Studies (BCIS), the Kotelawala Defence University (KDU), the Institute of National Security Studies Sri Lanka (INSSSL), and the Lakshman Kadirgamar Institute of International Relations and Strategic Studies (LKI)—in Colombo, Sri Lanka. The issues discussed included, how to take India-Sri Lanka relations forward, India's approach to the Indo-Pacific and India's neighbourhood policy. A five-member delegation from IDSA also visited Male during 06-08 March 2020, at the invitation from Major General Abdulla Shamaal, Chief of Defence Force (CDF), Maldives National Defence Force (MNDF) and held a bilateral dialogue with MNDF, the Maldivian National Counter Terrorism Centre (NCTC), and the Foreign Service Institute of Maldives (FOSIM).

The scholars also participated in national and international conferences and various training programmes aimed at sharing of perspectives on India's defence, security and foreign policies in response to the changing geopolitical dynamic in the region.

The Centre members were quite prolific in terms of their publications, including in newspapers. Apart from a comprehensive book titled *Pakistan Occupied Kashmir: Politics, Parties and Personalities*, (Surinder Kumar Sharma, Yaqoob-ul-Hassan, Ashok K. Behuria, Pentagon Press, 2019), which received an encouraging response from the strategic community, the members of the Centre published policy briefs, occasional papers, peer-reviewed articles and commentaries on topical issues focusing on important issues like India's renewed claim on PoK, study of trends and challenges in Pakistan's foreign policy, China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and Pakistan's economy, India's response to Chinese investments in the neighbouring countries, critical analysis of India-Sri Lanka relations, presidential elections in Sri Lanka, regular assessment of the popular estimation of the performance of the Imran Khan government in Pakistan, India-Bhutan relations, initial responses of different countries to COVID-19, peace process in Afghanistan, etc.

The Centre organised the 12th edition of its flagship event, the "South Asia Conference" on 28-29 January 2020 on the theme "India's 'Neighbourhood First' Policy: Regional Perceptions". Scholars and experts from all the South Asian countries participated in the event. There was high appreciation of India's revitalized 'neighbourhood first' policy and most of the participants from the neighbourhood agreed that there was a urgent need for countries to respond to the positive gestures by India and refashion their policies towards India to enable an impulse for regional cooperation, which could result in region-wide development, economic growth, prosperity and peace.

Southeast Asia and Oceania Centre

The Centre hosted delegations from the region and senior diplomats representing the region during the year. An interaction with a fivemember Australian High Commission delegation led by Captain Simon Bateman, Defence Adviser, was held on 11 March 2020. An interaction with the Ministry of Defence of the Republic of Indonesia took place on 26 November 2020. The Centre also organised an interaction on strategic issues with a visiting delegation from the Institute of Defence Strategy, Hanoi, on 15 November 2019. It also hosted another interaction with a delegation from the National Resilience Institute of Indonesia, on 24 April 2019. The Ambassador of Vietnam to India, called on the DG, IDSA on 26 July 2019. The Ambassador of Indonesia to India, Mr. Sidharto R. Suryodipuro, delivered a lecture on 'Growing India-Indonesia Relations and their Cooperation in the Indo-Pacific' at IDSA on 20 June 2019.

As part of a closer interface with the Government an interaction on East Asia, Vietnam and the region with Joint Secretary, Ministry of External Affairs (and Ambassador Designate to Vietnam), Shri Pranay Kumar Verma, was organised on 10 June 2019 which was chaired by DG, IDSA.

Scholars made presentations in conferences: The Centre Coordinator spoke on 'Thailand in India's Act East Policy: The Strategic Imperative' at the 14th ICSSR- National Research Council Thailand (NRCT) Joint Seminar at Varanasi on 25 February 2020. Other scholars spoke on India and Geopolitics of the Indo-Pacific at the Norwegian Embassy on 17 February 2020 and participated in a conversation on 'India and the Indo-Pacific' on the sidelines of the Raisina Dialogue 2020, in January 2020. The Centre Coordinator delivered lectures on 'India's Act East Policy' and 'India-Myanmar Relations' at the ITBP Academy, Mussoorie. He also spoke on 'The Geopolitics of Act East: Past, Present and Future' as part of a panel discussion on 'Five years of India's Act East Policy', organised by IPCS, New Delhi. At the South China Sea Dialogue-2019, organised by the Jindal School of International Affairs, O.P. Jindal Global University, at IIC, New Delhi, he spoke on 'Major Powers and International Response to South China Sea Developments' on 29 November 2019.

He also delivered a Lecture on "Strategic Significance of Vietnam in India's Act East Policy", to students and faculty of the University of Social Sciences and Humanities, Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam, on 08 November 2019 and gave a presentation at the 11th South China Sea International Conference on 'Cooperation for Regional Security and Development', organised by the Diplomatic Academy of Vietnam (DAV) at Hanoi. There was participation in a conversation on the Indo-Pacific organised by the Heritage Foundation in collaboration with the Observer Research Foundation on the topic, 'India on the Hill', in September 2019.

In continuation of the DG IDSA's new initiative to encourage Interns to make presentations on their research topics, Interns of the Southeast Asia and Oceania Centre made presentations on 'The Bay of Bengal Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic Cooperation' and 'Mekong-Ganga Cooperation' respectively on 26 July 2019.

As part of outreach efforts, the Centre Coordinator spoke on 'India and Myanmar Relations' on 'Spotlight', a programme broadcast on All India Radio, on 27 February 2020 and an article, 'Vietnam's economy comes of age' was published in the *Bangkok Post* on 23 December 2019. The Centre Coordinator participated in a panel discussion on 'India's Act East Policy: ASEAN Summit 2019' on Delhi Doordarshan's Urdu Channel on 28 November 2019. He wrote an article, 'International Politics in 2020', in the Experts' Corner, on the website of the Hermes Institute of International Affairs, Security and Geoeconomy, December 2019.

Director General, IDSA and Acting Director General, Institute of Defence Strategy (IDS), Vietnam, Maj. Gen. Dang Quang Minh signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in the presence of Hon'ble Raksha Mantri, Shri Rajnath Singh and Chief of General Staff (CGS), Vietnam People's Army and Minister of State, Sr. Lt. Gen. Pham Van Giang, at the South Block, on 25 November 2019.

Strategic Technologies Centre

In 2019-2020, The Centre organized an interaction with Mr Daniel Feakes, the Chief of the Implementation Support Unit of the Biological Weapons Convention on "The BWC at 45: Approaching the Ninth Review Conference" on 16 January 2020. Another interaction with Amb. Philips Griffith on "Wassenaar Arrangement and the Process of Export Controls" was organised on 17 January 2020.

The Centre also organised Training Programmes for the officers of:

- NTRO 25-29 November 2019
- DIG Rank Officers from BSF 09-13 December 2019
- BSF Commandant Officers 16-20 March 2020

The Centre participated in a two-day Cyber Exercise on Scenario Building & Response on "Cyber Warfare and Technology" from 29-30 April 2019.

During the year the scholars from the Centre have published various books, monographs, research articles and Policy Briefs. The Centre published a co-authored Occasional paper titled "Analysing China's Digital and Space BRI". Two issues of *CBW Magazine* and a co-authored Issue Brief on "Kudankulam: One Issue, Many Facets" were published during the period. The Centre submitted the *Annual Strategic Assessment of Cyber Security Threats and Challenges in 2019* in January 2020 and a report on *Defending and Securing Cyberspace: Responding to Recent Developments* to the National Cyber Security Co-ordinator's office in August 2019.

Apart from these publications, the Centre also organized a few Roundtable Discussions on various issues associated with technology and policy.

West Asia Centre

The West Asia Centre has focused on studying and analyzing the fast changing developments in the West Asian and North African (WANA) region. A key focus of the scholars in the Centre has been to study the impact of the ongoing regional turbulence on India, especially on the political, economic, security and strategic fronts. Besides, the Centre has engaged with a large number of scholars and thinkers from the region to deliberate on a range of issues. With this specific purpose, the West Asia Centre organised the 4th West Asia Conference on the theme "Ten Years of Political and Economic Transformation in West Asia: Challenges, Lessons and Future Trends" on 26-27 February 2020. The Conference focused on the key political, security and economic challenges the region is facing since the beginning of the Arab Spring protests in 2011; and to find a possible roadmap for India's engagement in future to secure its strategic, security and economic interests. The Hon'ble Minister of State for Road, Transport and Highways, Government of India, General Vijay Kumar Singh, PVSM, AVSM, YSM, Retd inaugurated the Conference and delivered the Keynote Address. A total of 32 delegates from India, Iran, Lebanon, Egypt, Iraq, the UAE, Israel, Saudi Arabia, Palestine, Kuwait, Russia, and the US participated in the Conference and 25 speakers presented papers.

As in the past, the Centre continued to expand its outreach with think tanks in the WANA region. The Centre signed a bilateral agreement with the Jerusalem Institute for Strategy and Security (JISS) on 02 September 2019, at Jerusalem, Israel. A four-member team from IDSA led by the DG, IDSA visited Jerusalem from 01-05 September 2019 and held the first Bilateral Dialogue with the JISS. The team also met with Mr. Gilad Cohen, Deputy Director General (Asia-Pacific), Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Israel on 05 September 2019 in Jerusalem and discussed a number of bilateral, regional and global issues.

The Centre also organised the India-Iran-Afghanistan Trilateral Dialogue on 07 June 2019 on the theme "Agenda for Future Cooperation". Delegates and scholars from the Institute for Political

and International Studies (IPIS), Tehran and the Afghan Institute for Strategic Studies, Kabul, participated in the Dialogue. The Dialogue focused on enhancing connectivity through projects such as INSTC and the Chabahar Port project for economic development, further strengthening security cooperation between India, Iran and Afghanistan, exploring the opportunities and addressing the challenges of India and Iran's development cooperation and partnership in Afghanistan, among others.

In order to gain greater understanding and to promote interactions with key strategic leaders and thinkers from the region, the Centre invited several scholars and practitioners from West Asia. On 11 April 2019, a closed-door interaction was held with Capt. Ali Al Sheedi, National Defence College, Oman and Cmdre. Thabit Mahmood Lashkaran Al Zadjali, Defence Attaché, Embassy of the Sultanate of Oman to India. Similarly, another closed-door interaction was held on 26 August 2019 with a 19-member delegation of journalists and editors from Turkey on the theme "India's Foreign and Security Policies and India-Turkey Bilateral Relations." On 02 May 2019, a Roundtable Discussion was held with Prof. Asher Susser from Tel Aviv University, Israel, on "Israel's Foreign Policy: Search for Security." On 20 May 2019, the Centre organised a Roundtable Discussion on "Growing US-Iran Tensions and Implications for India." On 18 January 2019, the Centre organised a Roundtable Discussion with Dr. Jasim Husain, former Member of Parliament, Bahrain on "Domestic Politics of Bahrain." The Centre also invited Dr. Saud bin Mohammed Al Sati, Ambassador of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to India on 05 February 2020 who delivered a talk on "Indo-Saudi Strategic Partnership: The Way Forward."

The Centre published five online editions of its newsletter *West Asia Watch: Trends and Analysis*, which provides a detailed account of major events and developments taking place in the region, interviews with leading national and international strategic thinkers and diplomats as

well as commentaries by the scholars on current and unfolding issues in the WANA region.

Further, the scholars of the West Asia Centre continued their study and research on important subjects such as India and unrest in the Arab world, India-Iran relations, India's West Asia policy, the GCC crisis, regional hotspots such as Syria, Yemen and Libya, resurgence of ISIS, counter-narratives and strategic communications against jihadist radicalization, the democratization dilemma and challenges for Turkey among other issues. The scholars also published several indepth research papers and articles for IDSA's in-house journals and website, as well as for noted national and international journals and media outlets.

The Institute for Defence Studies and Analyses (IDSA) organised the 10th Y.B. TRAINING

There is a growing demand on IDSA for converting its cutting edge research into training courses. The Institute organized 10 training programmes for officers of the National Technical Research Organisation, Border Security Force, Ordanace Factories Board and Indian Air Force. Enhancing the Institute's capacity to handle the training courses will be in the interest of the future growth of the Institute. The details of the training programmes are at Annexure VIII.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Several government agencies (including the National Security Council Secretariat, Ministry of External Affairs, and Ministry of Information Technology) have shown interest in involving the Institute in various projects. The IDSA-MEA collaboration has grown over the years. IDSA has been conducting the PoK Project for the MEA for several years and the Project continued this year also. A project commissioned by the Ministry of Information Technology on Global, Regional and Domestic Factors Impacting India's Cyber Security is also ongoing. (Annexure IV).

The Institute organized several high-profile conferences, Roundtables and national seminars during the year. In all 2 international conferences and 12 national conferences, seminars/workshops symposiums/panel discussions were held. In addition 35 Roundtable Discussions, 22 Special/Eminent Persons Talks, 1 Bilateral Interaction and 18 Special Interactions were also held on a series of topics. Details are at Annexure III. The above activities provided an opportunity for close interaction with the strategic community in India and abroad.

PUBLICATIONS

During the year, IDSA scholars published nine books and three monographs. Apart from this, the Institute published six issues of *Strategic Analysis*, four issues of the *Journal of Defence Studies*, two issues of the *CBW Magazine*, four Occasional Papers, three Policy Briefs and 10 Issue Briefs. In addition, 12 Articles, 17 Book Reviews/ Review Essays/ in IDSA journals and 10 Chapters in IDSA books, 57 Web Commentaries and 141 articles were published in various newspapers and magazines. The IDSA website got 28,05,338 page views during the year, on an average of 2,33,778 published page views per month.

Newsletters

A wide range of periodicals/newsletters/news digests were published during the year. These included *The Week in Review; POK News Digest; South Asia Trends; Africa Trends; Indian Ocean Watch, Insight Southeast Asia, Pakistan News Digest, East Asia Military Monitor, West Asia Watch, Strategic Digest, Bangladesh Press Digest, Japan Digest and West Asia Digest.*

The IDSA Library and the Information Resource Division continued to work to deliver high quality and innovative services. New technologies for information dissemination were adopted in order to make information accessible to scholars within the IDSA and outside. The Institute continued to create more digital content and image content on its Facebook page and Multimedia section.

The IDSA Library participated in the New Delhi World Book Fair during the period under review. The Institute's participation in the New Delhi World Book Fair began in 2013.

The Library supports the research community on a range of key areas and makes an immeasurable contribution to the Institute. The Institute is working with a growing network of partners from different institutions and government organizations (Annexure VI).

AWARDS

The Institute confers two Awards, i.e., the K. Subrahmanyam Award and the President's Award for Excellence. The K. Subrahmanyam Award is conferred to an outstanding Indian scholar/journalist and the President's Award for Excellence is conferred to encourage the Institute's young scholars to write in reputed and refereed journals. Annexure XI contains the details of past awardees.

GRANT-IN-AID TO IDSA

IDSA was sanctioned an amount of Rs 2267 lakhs as Grant-in-Aid for the Financial Year 2019-2020 which also includes an amount of Rs 255 lakhs towards payment of arrears of pay and allowances for the period from 01.01.2016 to 28.02.2018 on implementation of 7th CPC recommendations in IDSA. Out of the said amount of Rs 2267 lakhs, an amount of Rs 72.14 lakhs, being unutilized grant due to COVID-19 preventive measures, was refunded to MoD, which resulted in the net Grant-in-Aid of Rs 2194.86 lakhs for the Financial Year 2019-20.







Journal Circulation - Number of Institutions with Access Via Subscription, Sales Deal or Subject Collection




Article Downloads - Taylor & Francis Online (TFO) Usage

Journal of Defence Studies

The Journal of Defence Studies (JDS) is a peer-reviewed research journal with a special focus on the core issues of defence, and national security and strategy. Launched as an annual publication in 2007, JDS is now published as a quarterly. The journal seeks to encourage further research on the core issues of defence and provides the latest perspectives on defence-related issues. It serves as a platform for sharing research findings and opinions of scholars working on defence-related issues, both within the IDSA and elsewhere. Each issue contains a mix of research articles, essays, topical commentaries, opinion pieces and book reviews. Special issues are also published periodically; some important themes that have recently been covered in such issues include the 1962 India-China War, Ethics and Morals in the Armed Forces, and

the 1965 India-Pakistan War, Internal Security, and the Kargil War of 1999.

Two general issues (including one combined issue) and one special issue of *JDS* were published during the year in review. The **April-June 2019** issue (Vol. 13, No. 2) was a general issue that featured two insightful articles on broadening the scope of civil military relations, and the Internet of Things (IoT) and its growing importance in the military domain. It also included a review article on nuclear weapons and five book reviews.

The July-September 2019 issue (Vol. 13, No. 3) was a special issue on the theme 'National Security since Kargil' which was conceptualized with the intention of obtaining a 360-degree perspective of where India stands 20 years after the Kargil War. It featured assessments of various aspects which arose from this operation, by practitioners, servicemen and diplomats. The issue also published two book reviews.

The October-December 2019 (Vol. 13, No. 4) issue featured insightful articles on the lessons from the UK's defence privatisation experience for India, the importance of ethics vis-à-vis the armed forces, the latest Chinese DF-41 missile and its impact on the country's nuclear deterrence, and a new conceptual framework for peacekeeping. The issue also featured four book reviews.

The January-June 2020 (Vol. 14, Nos 1-2) was an issue that combined the separate January-March and April-June issues into one. This issue featured perspectives on human capital for the new Department of Military Affairs and United Nations peacekeeping. It also included four incisive articles on achieving jointness in war, Mahan's influence on Japanese maritime strategy, illicit drug trafficking and terror finance, and the evolving role of the IFA in defence. Five book reviews completed the issue.

JDS has maintained its contributor base and readership in the past year, and is being read and cited by members of the defence and strategic, and related academic communities worldwide and within

India. Its availability online and free download facility has facilitated this in considerable measure. *JDS* continues its publishing tie-up with Bloomsbury India Ltd., and is set to continue this for the next few years.

JDS' Facebook page currently has 3,967 followers and 3,970 'likes'. It continues to be viewed regularly, which means that the posts are reaching more and more people and this is generating more interest in the publication. IDSA LIBRARY

The IDSA Library continues to be the primary source of information with a rich collection of 59,831 books and a number of CD-ROM databases. During 2019-20, 236 new books were added to the library collection. 200 current journals were received in print and electronic/online versions. Four International newspapers and 23 National newspapers were received.

The Library activities, viz., acquisition, cataloguing, circulation and inventory control have been computerized. The Library Holdings Database, i.e., the online catalogue, can be accessed through the internal LAN. IDSA Library's Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) has also been uploaded on the internet and can be accessed by anyone. IDSA scholars can reserve

as well as indent books from their desks. The Library recorded 12,31,608 hits during the year under review for its online resources.

The Information Services Group (ISG) continues to provide Internet-based information services to IDSA scholars and also to IDSA members and officials in the government. 3,550 information service requests were attended to during the year.



• The section Ask an Expert was started on 10 June 2010. Till 31 March 2020, more than 898 questions have been answered. In the financial year 2019-20, 62 questions were answered.

- <u>IDSA on Facebook</u>: As on 04 July 2020 IDSA had 22,560 followers. On 04 July 2019 the page had 22,086 followers.

GEOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION SYSTEM (GIS)

The main objective of GIS section is to provide Geospatial Training to interested research scholars and to provide support through maps and other geospatial solutions in the research work being carried out at IDSA.

The GIS section maintains a *Geo-Spatial Database*, wherein information and customized maps, related to natural, political, economic, social and cultural aspects of various countries around the world is stored and regularly updated, especially South Asia. Geographical data/information at different administrative levels for each country-International boundary, State boundary, District boundary and Wards boundary, transport and communication networks, and other socioeconomic information, is being downloaded and collected from the internet periodically.

This year also the Institute continued with updating GIS/Remote Sensing data related to the Indian Region. GIS datasets for the world from different sources like Natural Earth, USGS, VDS Tech, OCLA, ArcGIS Geoportals website, etc., were regularly updated for any new information/data.

A total of 2179 customized maps have been prepared since the inception of the GIS section. During this financial year (1 April 2019-31 March 2020), 118 customized maps have been prepared.

These maps are being regularly used by the scholars for their reference, presentation or for publication purposes.

The Institute also provided basic GIS training to interested scholars and interns, focusing on the basic concepts of GIS and how to create, interpret and represent geo-spatial data from time to time.

Schedule 11:- Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Accounts

A Accounting Policies

- 1 The Accounts are prepared on accrual basis except specifically provided otherwise.
- 2 Gratuity, Leave Encashment and Other Retirement Benefits are being accounted for on cash basis at the time of actual payment.
- 3 Fixed Assets have been shown at cost less depreciation. Depreciation has been charged as per Income Tax rules 1962 except on Library Books on which no depreciation is charged being research and reference books.
- 4 Cost of Publication incurred by Institute is debited to income and expenditure Account. Closing Stock of unsold publications are not taken into Account.
- 5 Subscription received from Members and Life membership fee received is considered as income for the year in which it is received.
- 6 Grant-in-Aid pertaining to allied services at MP-IDSA New Campus is kept as such in the liabilities, pending receipt of details of expenditure from DRDO. In the earlier years, the amount paid to DRDO out of Grant-in-Aid for renovation work of our office at old JNU campus, was credited to the income for that years and surplus transferred to General fund. The remaining amount after adjustment of expenditure has been withdrawn from the General fund and retained as liability under the head Grant-in-Aid (New Campus).

B Notes to Accounts

1. The construction of MP-IDSA Campus was carried out by DRDO as Deposit Works. The physical possession of New Campus was taken over in February 2007 but the proper handing over and taken over (including of all the assets) has been finalized in 2013-14. DRDO was paid the total amount of Rs 45.66 Crores (Rs 41.21 Crores for construction and Rs 4.45 Crores for allied works) as "Deposit Works". DRDO has already rendered the account for the construction cost which was accounted for accordingly in Books of Accounts during the financial year 2013-2014. As regards the allied works assigned to DRDO and paid Rs 4.45 Crores, a withdrawal for an amount of Rs 44,05,123/- was made from DRDO till 31/03/2014 for some allied works which was carried out by the Institute itself and also accordingly incorporated in respective head of



accounts during the year 2013-2014. DRDO has now submitted the final account for the expenditure incurred by them against the remaining amount together with refund of unspent amount but the details furnished is incomplete and DRDO has been asked to provide the full details (i.e head wise expenditure) to enable us to incorporate the expenditure accordingly and charge depreciation on asset items for the previous years from the date of its purchase/commissioned in MP-IDSA. Thus, the said expenditure incurred on allied services has been kept under the head "Capital Work in Progress" subject to adjustment on receipt of complete details from DRDO.

- 2. The Deposit with Bank under Schedule 6 includes Rs.13,24,60,932/- in Fixed Deposit (including interest accrued till 31.03.2020) created out of various income generated by the Institute included in the General Fund in the Balance Sheet from time to time. The matter which was taken up with the Ministry of Defence for their decision to allow MP-IDSA to create a separate Corpus Fund for the said receipts, as approved by Executive Council, MP-IDSA or to deposit the same in Govt. Treasury is still awaited.
- 3. The Institute is maintaining GPF Account for its regular employees and their Contribution to GPF has been deposited regularly by the Institute in a separate Bank account maintained with State Bank of India, Main Branch, New Delhi. The balance in this account has not been considered in the Institute's Balance Sheet. Accordingly, the investment of General Provident Fund money carried out from time to time has also been kept separately and not considered in MP-IDSA's Balance Sheet. The details of balance in said account and the amount invested as on 31.03.2020 (including interest accrued on FDs) is as under:

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Against the above said investment, the liability of GP Fund (including interest) payable to the employees covered under the scheme as on 31.03.2020 amounted to **Rs 3,98,80,353/-**. The shortfall of Rs 1,90,779/81 will however be accounted for on Cash basis at the time of Full and Final settlement of the GPF accounts.

Further, as regards the PF contribution in respect of contract employees covered under the EPF and MP Act 1952, the employees contribution together with Institute's share has been deposited regularly with the office of EPFO on line.

- 4. MP-IDSA was sanctioned an amount of Rs.22,67,00,000/- as Grant-in-Aid for the financial year 2019-2020. Out of this, an amount of Rs 72,14,154/- being unutilized Grant refunded to MoD vide Cheque no. 074066 dated 31.03.2020, resulted in to the net Grant-in-Aid of Rs 21,94,85,846/-for the year 2019-20. Out of the said amount of Rs 21,94,85,846/- an amount of Rs 28,99,506/- has been utilised for acquisition of Fixed Assets and the remaining amount of Rs 21,65,86,340/- is recognised as income.
- 5. Consequent upon receipt of approval from MoD during the month of December 2018, the benefits of 7th CPC recommendations were extended to the employees of MP-IDSA and accordingly the expenditure for the year 2018-2019 was met out of the regular budget for the year. As regards the arrears (01.01.2016 to 28.02.2018), since no additional funds were sanctioned by MoD in FY 2018-19, the liability for the same of Rs 255.82 Lakhs was provided in 2018-19 accounts in view of MP-IDSA's Policy to maintain the accounts on accrual basis. The said liability has been discharged in the current financial year 2019-2020 on receipt of additional funds from MoD.
- Grants received and expenses incurred for a specific project is knocked off and project wise net balance outstanding at the year-end has been shown under project grant account (Schedule No. 3) in Balance Sheet.
- 7. Liability for the pension in case of non-receipt of Life Certificate has not been provided in Books. The claim for the same if any will be accounted for during the year of claim by the Pensioner.





- 8. Outstanding amount more than three years from the due date of payment in Stale Cheques has been written back and treated as income.
- 9. Contingent Liability for the pending legal cases Rs 18.22 Lacs (Previous year 22.62Lacs)

10. The Institute is registered u/s 12A (a) of Income Tax Act, 1961.
