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How far off are practical quantum computers? Maybe a decade, says China's leader in the field

A researcher known in China as the father of quantum computing says he and his team aim to be developing general-purpose quantum computers as soon as a decade from now, according to a Chinese media report. "We hope to build universal quantum computers through 10 to 15 years of hard work," Shanghai-based news outlet The Paper quoted Pan Jianwei as saying on Friday. "Once we solve quantum error correction within the next five years, we'll be able to manipulate hundreds or even thousands of qubits to build quantum simulators and address problems in physics, chemistry, and life sciences – problems that today's supercomputers can never solve," he said at the World Sound Expo in Hefei, Anhui province. Pan also said his team at the University of Science and Technology of China in Hefei aimed to realise applications in quantum cryptanalysis and large number decomposition within the same time.

South Korea, Taiwan affected by growing U.S.-China high-tech tensions

When SK Hynix Vice President Kim Jin-hyock visited Dalian, China, in late September, the local Communst Party chief had a clear message for him: The South Korean memory chip maker should "deepen cooperation with the party by expanding investment and business without letting up." SK, the world's fourth-largest chipmaker, purchased Intel's NAND flash memory chip plant in Dalian in late 2021 and is now building an additional factory there. While cooperation with the party is indispensable for almost any foreign company in China, the party's calls for "collaboration" are starting to take on a more political tinge. Chinese President Xi Jinping, who recently began a historic third term as party leader, has vowed that China will "win the battle in key core technologies." Beijing, he said, will accelerate programs related to "independence and self-reliance" over the next five years in order to compete with the U.S. in the field of high technology.

Harris' Philippines visit aims to fan conflicts surrounding South China Sea and Taiwan Straits

Pursuing an agenda of fanning conflicts surrounding the South China Sea and Taiwan questions and containing China, US Vice President Kamala Harris was in the Philippines for a three-day visit after

attending the APEC meeting in Thailand and met with President Ferdinand Marcos Jr, becoming the highest-ranking American official to visit the country since Marcos took power in June. But for officials in Manila and other countries in Southeast Asia, who loathe being caught in a big power rivalry, the US peddling of the "China threat" in the region will make them realize who is the real saboteur of regional security and stability, and alienate them further from the US. Harris' visit is seen by Chinese observers as a glimpse into US policy on China after the leaders of the two countries met in Indonesia. They believed that while the leaders' meeting ushered in a "remission" of conflict, Harris' visit, along with US politicians' recent remarks, serves as a reminder that Washington's antagonism and hostility toward China remain unchanged.

China's space station will run high-energy beam experiment for controversial solar power plant: chief scientist

China's space station will join a controversial project to collect solar power from space and send it to Earth in a high-energy microwave beam, according to a senior scientist. The Chinese space station Tiangong – which means "heavenly palace" – became fully operational when the last major service module, Mengtian, docked this month. Some space scientists have suggested Tiangong – the largest infrastructure in orbit owned and run exclusively by a single country at present – can change the pace or direction of the space race. Yang Hong, chief designer of the space station, told a conference in Wenchang, Hainan, that Tiangong would play a key role in China's space solar power station (SSPS) project by providing a testing platform for high-voltage electric devices and in helping assemble ultra-large structures.

China is ready to make a key component for the world's largest fusion reactor

China has taken a major step towards a key contribution to an international mega-project aimed at creating energy through fusion – a potentially unlimited source of future energy. Scientists said they have successfully built and tested the first panel of an ultra-heat-resistant component for the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor (ITER), the world's largest fusion reactor. The components, which must endure super hot gas – known as plasma – up to 150 million degrees Celsius (270 million Fahrenheit) inside ITER's doughnut-shaped chamber, "exceeded design performance and are ready for mass production," its developer, the Southwestern Institute of Physics, said, according to the China National Nuclear Corporation. The institute's chief scientist, Chen Jiming, hailed the achievement as "a substantial breakthrough after thousands of experiments and 18 years of hard work", and another example of China "fulfilling its commitments to ITER".

China's armed forces are increasingly engaging in nonmilitary warfare on Taiwan that weaponizes disinformation and psychological manipulation, according to a report released by a Japanese Defense Ministry think tank. The annual China Security Report, published by the National Institute for Defense Studies (NIDS), focuses on the cognitive warfare being adopted by the Chinese Communist Party. That approach propagates information useful to the party through social media platforms and cyberspace. China is fielding highly diversified influence operations, according to the report. They include "public opinion warfare" to influence perceptions, "psychological warfare" that relies on intimidation, and "legal warfare" that takes the battle to the courts.

U.K. Backs Giant Nuclear Plant, Squeezing Out China

The British government threw its weight behind nuclear power, saying it will back a major new generating plant on the coast of the North Sea northeast of London. The government said it would invest 700 million pounds (\$839 million) for a 50 percent stake in the plant, known as Sizewell C. EDF, the French state utility, which will construct the plant, will hold the rest. The deal squeezes out a Chinese state-owned company, China General Nuclear, which had owned 20 percent of the project. CGN received an undisclosed sum for its share, reflecting its value and representing a commercial return on development work to date, the British government said.

Starlink breaks space traffic safety rules and China may follow: study

A team of Chinese space engineers has accused SpaceX's Starlink satellites of breaking the traffic rules of Earth's lower orbit and warned that China will be giving the US an upper hand if it does not follow suit. The researchers said two of Starlink's newest satellites, equipped with high-speed laser communication devices, came within 4.9km (3 miles) of each other on June 30. The commonly accepted – if unwritten – minimum distance to avoid collision is 10km (6.2 miles). In a study published by Chinese peer-reviewed journal Radio Engineering, the researchers said the unusually dense formation was no accident, but the result of a complex scheme by SpaceX to maximise the performance of its laser communications.

China could have 1,500 nuclear warheads by 2035: Pentagon report

China's stockpile of nuclear warheads has surpassed 400 in a fraction of the time previously estimated by the United States, a major Pentagon report revealed, with Beijing focusing on accelerating its nuclear expansion as it seeks to challenge the US as the world's top super power. In 2020, the US estimated that China had nuclear warheads numbering in the low-200s and expected the stockpile to double within a

decade. Just two years later, China has reached that mark and could have some 1,500 nuclear warheads by 2035 if they continue to expand their stockpile at the current pace, according to the 2022 China Military Power report. "What we've seen really in the past couple of years is this accelerated expansion," said a senior defense official.

Xi Jinping faces stiffest challenge to rule as Covid outrage sparks mass protests

Xi Jinping faces one of his greatest challenges as president of China after tens of thousands of people took to the streets over Beijing's strict coronavirus controls and suppression of freedom of speech. At least 10 cities, including Shanghai, Beijing, Wuhan and Chengdu, were shaken by rare political protests over the weekend, triggering clashes with police and security officers that led to a spate of detentions, including of two foreign journalists. The sudden outbreak of civil disobedience was sparked by outrage after a deadly apartment fire in Urumqi, Xinjiang, was partly blamed on coronavirus restrictions. While most of the protests appeared to have been stamped out, they followed months of frustration, especially among China's young people, with relentless lockdowns, quarantines, mass testing and electronic surveillance under Xi's zero-Covid policies.

China sends new trio of mysterious spy satellites into orbit

China's latest launch has put three new Yaogan spy satellites into orbit. A Long March 2D rocket blasted off from Xichang Satellite Launch Center in southwestern China on Sunday (November 27) at 07:23 AM. EST (1223 GMT; 08:23PM Beijing time). The Chinese space industry(opens in new tab) and media reports (opens in new tab)suggest that the launch carried a single Yaogan 36 remote sensing satellite. However space tracking by the U.S. Space Force's 18th Space Defense Squadron, which focuses on space domain awareness, registered three payloads in orbit in roughly 300-mile-altitude (500 km) orbits. China's previous two launches involving Yaogan 36 satellites also saw satellite triplets sent into orbit, meaning the latest launch was a third group of three Yaogan 36 satellites.

"What we are seeing and what we are doing... is looking into the areas where China poses a challenge... and taking appropriate steps accordingly."

China launches Shenzhou-15 spaceship, aiming for first in-orbit crew rotation

China launched the manned spaceship Shenzhou-15, with three astronauts onboard due to meet with their colleagues on the country's space station and conduct a work handover. The spaceship, atop the Long March-2F Y15 carrier rocket, blasted off from the Jiuquan Satellite Launch Center in northwest China, according to the China Manned Space Agency (CMSA). About 10 minutes after the launch, Shenzhou-15 separated from the rocket and entered its designated orbit. The crew members are in good shape and the launch is a complete success, the CMSA declared. After entering orbit, the Shenzhou-15 spaceship will make a fast, automated rendezvous and dock with the space station combination. The Shenzhou-15 astronauts will, for the first time in China's space history, conduct an in-orbit rotation with the Shenzhou-14 crew, who were sent to the space station in June, said the CMSA.

China enlists Alibaba and Tencent in fight against US chip sanctions

China has enlisted tech giants Alibaba and Tencent to aid its efforts in designing semiconductor chips, as Beijing braces for further US-led sanctions aimed at suppressing Chinese computing power. The Chinese government has set up a consortium of companies and research institutes, including the Chinese Academy of Sciences, to create new chip intellectual property. Beijing wants to reduce its dependence on SoftBankowned Arm, whose technology underpins the majority of semiconductors around the world. The group is using Risc-V — pronounced "Risc-five" — an open-source chip design architecture created in 2010 by the University of California, Berkeley. Risc-V has emerged as a competitor to Arm in recent years. Open-source code can be produced, accessed, used and enhanced by anyone.

But then concerns over the national security implications, led by the US, prompted countries such as the UK, France and Canada to ban or phase out Huawei equipment from their 5G infrastructure.
